As the Interim Director of the Chez Veterans Center (CVC), I am honored to serve veterans and military-connected students at the University of Illinois. 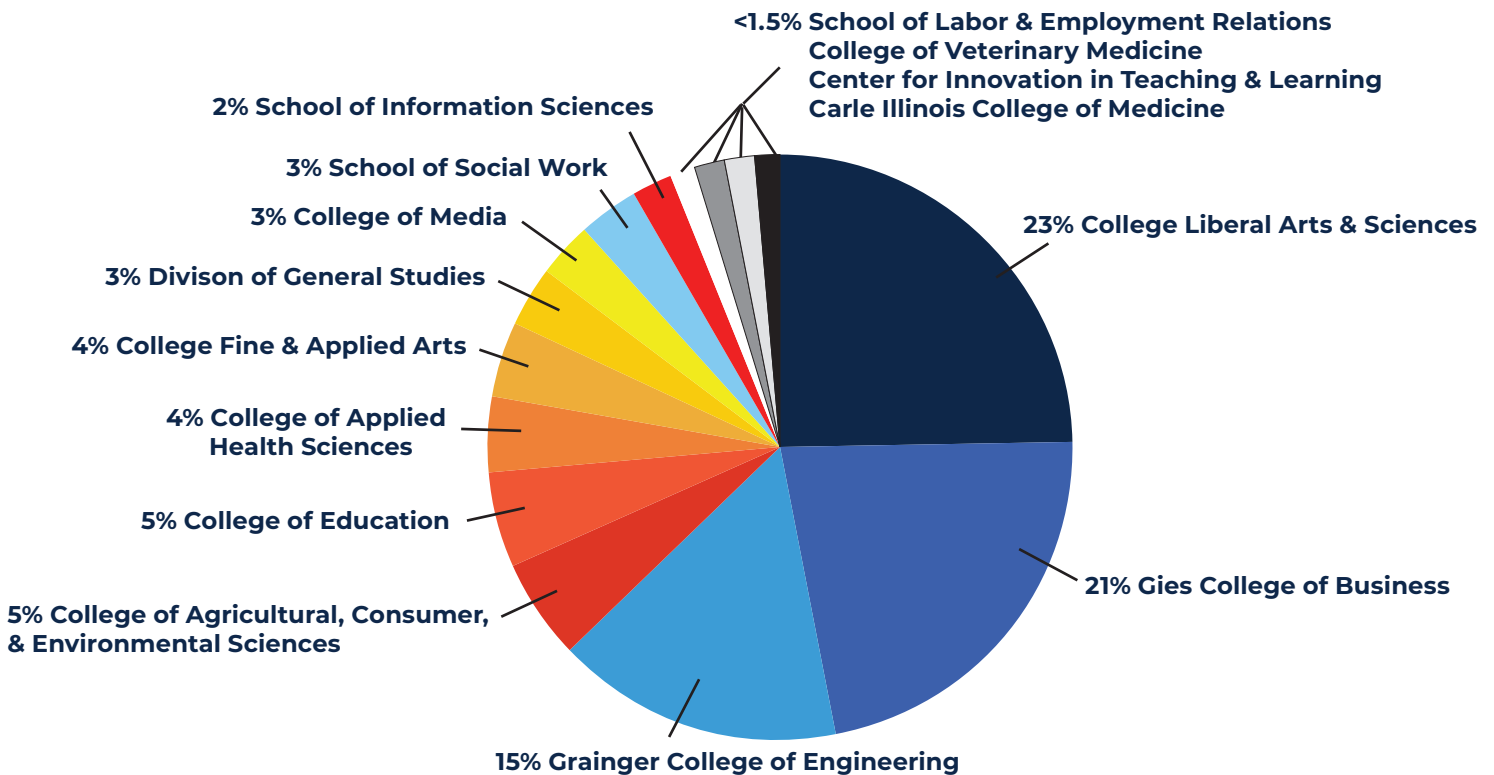

MSKC SEED GRANTS

\$120,000 8 seed grants of \$15,000 each have been distributed since 2018

The Chez Veterans Center facilitates and catalyzes Military/Veteran-focused research across campus through its Military Service Knowledge Collaborative (MSKC). The mission of the MSKC is to foster collaboration between researchers and Military/Veteran communities that includes:

- Strategic partnering to facilitate access for recruitment and ensure the needs of this community are central to project development
- Community events that create spaces for researchers and Military/Veteran stakeholders to network
- Educational trainings and workshops tailored to fuse the societal military-civilian divide and help researchers develop necessary cultural competencies for engaging with this community in research

The MSKC Research Seed Grant Program provides support for researchers to develop partnerships with Military/Veteran communities and explore research that will spark innovative and progressive change. Funded projects include:

- Healing the Aftermath of War: Evaluating the REBOOT Combat Recovery Program
- MR Elastography (MRE) as a Biomarker for Post-Traumatic Epilepsy (PTE)
- Partnering with Military Families via Telehealth: Empowering Caregivers and Enhancing Communication Skills of Children with Autism
- Identifying Changing Responsibilities and Support Needs of Aging Caregivers of Veterans with Traumatic Brain Injury
- Examining the Intersection between Cannabis, Opioids and Benzodiazepine Use by Older Veterans in Illinois

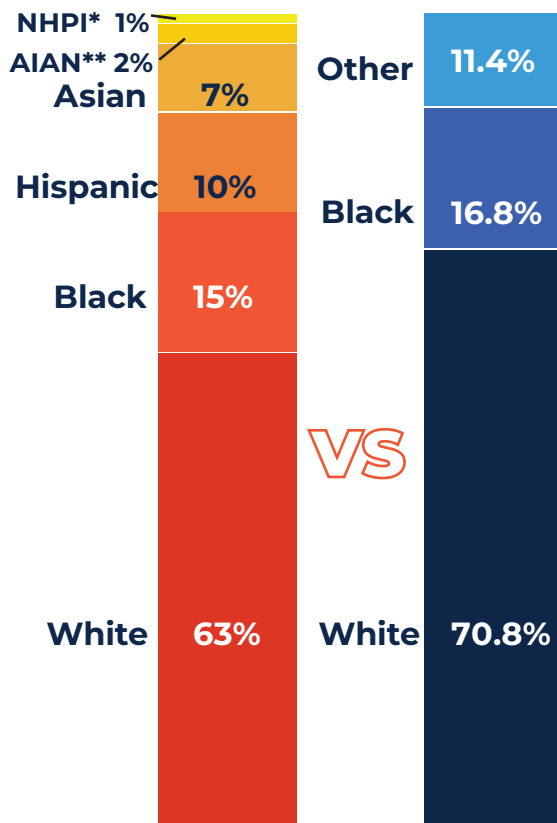

She, her husband, and daughter have a total of seven degrees between them. The third floor of the CVC is named the "CAPT J. E. Puccini, USN, Adeline K. and Nancy Ann Puccini Residential Floor."

Jo feels the twenty years she spent as a navy wife, working with her husband for the U.S. Navy, were the best years of her life. During that time, she felt privileged to meet the Joint Chiefs of Staff while welcoming Senator Jeremiah Denton and his wife to Washington, D.C. (Senator Denton was a U.S. Navy Rear Admiral and Naval Aviator.)
